# Message From the Secretary,

Dear Friends,

It is with profound gratification, I present the Annual Report for the year 2006-07.

At the outset, I would like to fondly extend gratitude to our beloved Bishop and President of KMSSS the Most Rev. P. Remigius, D.D. for his towering guidance and support towards the cause of underprivileged masses of our Diocese, through KMSSS during his tenure for well over 17 long years.

This year has passed off with the accomplishment of an array of diverse programmes. A few of them were pioneering in nature, such as the massive **Sustainable**Agriculture Programme and the creation of infrastructural facilities to fulfill the long pending educational needs of the children belonging to the underprivileged sections from the villages of our working areas.

Sustainable Agriculture being one of our most focused interventions in the recent years, especially in the dry tract of Andimadam and Jeyankondam Blocks. It is worth mentioning considering the colossal loss and damage caused to the livelihood resources which form part of the environment and eco-system of area. In association with "Manos Unidas" Spain, an extensive organic farming initiative covering about 600 farmers of 30 villages in the block of Andimadam has been underway.

Similarly the Community Based Rehabilitation Programme, (CBR) saw the establishment of the "Day Care Centres" for the disabled children, especially those with Cerebral Palsy and Mental Retardation. The facilitation interventions towards empowering the women through formation of SHGs and confederating them into federations have reached the crucial stage of culminating in the formation of the "Peoples Bank" a couple of years back. And this structure has got further strengthened this year.

The CCCI Canada supported "TAMIL Project" for sponsored children has all along been one of the prominent programmes of KMSSS. This is in view of our attaching primary importance to the education of children from the poorest among the poor, as the solid foundation and most powerful tool towards attaining the cherished goal of the Empowerment of the Marginalized and the Oppressed Communities. Home for the Boys at Pazhavathankattalai, which is to serve as a Resource Centre, completes in all respects and the well equipped exclusive CCCI section within our Administrative Office were established during the year.

The 2006 elections to the local civic bodies served as a great opportunity for the women of our Self Help Movement, who have attained a moderate degree of social empowerment, to experiment and have hands-on experience in the Electoral politics, as part of progress towards achieving political empowerment. Many of them have come out in flying colours having won various positions in the "Local Panchayats".

I am duty bound to convey my gratitude to all the Partners.the Funding Agencies, the various Government Departments, the Bankers and the committed Staff members of our team and well wishers -Auditors, and Legal Advisors for their cooperation and unstinted support. Towards concluding my note, I wish to place on record our sincere thanks to our Vice President Msgr. C. Peter Francis, Treasurer Rev. Fr. G. Christuraj and our Asst. Secretary Rev.Fr.S. Alphonse and all the Governing Body and the General Body Members for extending their valuable cooperation and encouragement in our endeavours throughout the year, while thanking again our patron and Bishop for his untiring leadership in executing all our Projects and Programmes.

## Promotion of People's Bank / Sangamam:

Through KMSSS efforts, the practice of inter-lending by the Sangams is already established. As a measure of self help process of development the grass root sangams together formulated a macro level (union level) service provider system for the purpose of micro credit which is more encourageous and serve the purpose of financial needs of members. To form this Sangamam/People's Bank, each village sangam contributes a sum which fetches an equal amount from the organization. This facilitates easy circulation of micro-credit among themselves.

Union level and District level trainings and meetings were conducted to capacitate the Groups and Sangams. Topics on: Federation building, political parties, problem analysis, resource mobilization, asset creation, Panchayat Raj system, issues analyzes, planning process, Managerial aspects, networking and trade union were taught to them either by local project resource team or external subject specialists, apart from field exposures.

Training helps to prepare and to gain knowledge and skills or behaviour modification. Informal training is imparted through various ways and to make them fit to do something easily with crispness. To prepare federation leaders and members, different topics are dealt with related to the goals and objectives of the programme.

# Special achievements through Federation:

- Connecting road for Thittankuttai village, about a kilometer in length was obtained through the efforts of local Agro labourers federation.
- Representing in Grama Sabha Meeting about the non availability of street light, resulted in installation of 5 street lights.
- In Kollapuram, 2 kms Road, worth of Rs. 1,84,000/- has been sanctioned through the representation given to the B.D.O. by two women groups of this village. .
- Exclusively for the use of Scheduled Caste people of Kulothunganallur, cement road was laid for a length of 200 meters.
- For easy movement of villagers of Suthamalli, with the active lobbying of union level federation leaders additional bus facility was arranged.
- Street light and drinking water pipeline connection for the use of villagers were obtained at Arulmozhi, Suthamalli, Sinthamani villages by effort of Sangams and Union Level Federation's follow-up effort.
- Naduvalur village sangam got public distribution outlet of Civil Supplies Department to benefit easy access to all the families of this village,
- Two Cement roads with a length of 100 & 200 meters have been laid through the continuous contact and request of the women sangam and federation, benefiting the people of Nadhiyanur and Thirumanur village.
- In Papanasam and Ammapettai unions, a seminar was conducted on "Violence against women" by the Federations On 25.11.2006 in which 150 women took part.
- The local women Police wing and the women federation jointly organized an awareness meeting cum seminar on 16.12.2006 at Papanasam in which more than 100 women participated.
- Malpractices of P.D.S. in Weighing ration commodities were represented to the official (Tahsildar) by local women sangams and federation and got the problem solved.
- With an intention of creating more specific awareness about the Democratic process of Panchayat Raj election, 2000 pamphlets were printed by Federation leaders and distributed in Papanasam area.
- At Punalvasal village, even after persisting requests the local political parties refused to remove Flag Posts erected in the common place. Women group boldly removed all the political parties flag posts over night.

#### Network Programme:

World Women's Day was held at Coimbatore on 08.03.2007 as an effort to bring together the Tamil Nadu Women Federation under a common platform and to insist upon 33% reservation to women. From KMSSS field area, 50 women leaders participated in the Women's Day function and deliberations.

#### Introduction:

Sangam from its inception in the area of Diocese considering the local needs and problems. SHG scheme is being implemented in Thiruvidaimarudhur and Kumbakonam Community Development Blocks from the year 1999. And Thiruppanandal Block is added from this year for easy implementation and coordination with Tamil Nadu Mahalir Thittam of Thanjavur District.

#### Goal and Objectives:

To find change in socio-economic status of the rural poor women in the entire State of Tamil Nadu and to enhance the Self Help process and empowerment through Self Help Groups.

- The objectives delineate the development of Groups Awareness, Savings, Micro-Credit (inter-lending) women leadership, building economic sustainability through Government and Bank Loans.
- Fostering Self Help process, solidarity in decision making, social reforms, health and family welfare, and removal of women oppression.
- Empowering women in skills of financial management, self confidence, networking, income generation, assets creation, and federation formation.

- In Annakarankuppam village, Government contract for construction of Anganwadi centre worth about Rs. 1,20,000/- was undertaken by the Group and completed.
- In Koovathur village an over head tank got sanctioned through proper approach
  of the groups.
- Common facility like rural approach roads, cement roads and metal roads were obtained through collective initiative of the groups.
- In Vilandai village, 20 Dalit people who belong to our Group got land 'title deed' through applying to the revenue and social welfare department officials.
- Under "Janashri Bima Yojana" Scheme (L.I.C) 212 persons insured. 189 children belong to the insured parents were given the benefit of educational assistance by the L.I.C.

Kumbakonam Multipurpose Social Service Society gratefully remembers the Donor Agency, the "Christian Child Care International", Canada for the continued assistance and encouragement. The society is able to assist 890 children (5-20 age groups) both male and female to attain their basic education.

#### Mission:

With the support of the community initiatives in developing educational and personal growth of the children through the sponsorship programme.

#### Imbibing, Moral, Social and Religious values:

- To affirm the sacredness of life and dignity of all the people, especially the children and parents.
- To make our children fully capable of identifying and addressing social conditions.
- o To manifest or to shower the Christ loving care for the poor and the suffering that is an essential element of Jesus teachings.

#### Goal:

"To alleviate the effects of poverty by offering an effective and trustworthy Sponsorship Programme that reflects God's Love and Mercy".

## Objectives:

- To provide Basic education, nutrition, clothing and health.
- To build up solidarity among the children,
- To foster personality developments.
- To promote social awareness, health and hygiene to the parents.

# The summer camps - An experience of Rejuvenation & Learning:

Summer camps for the sponsored children were conducted at Elakurichy, Kumbakonam and Papanasam in the month of April 2006, with 3 days duration each. Except a few, all the children took part in the summer camp: enthusiastically. The camps went a long way in rejuvenating the spirits of the children, apart from imparting some of the essentials of the Life Skills. And the children thoroughly enjoyed every session of the camps, which were highly informative and served as Curtain Raisers about their future.

All the 3 camps ended with distribution of Groceries, Bed sheets, Bedcover, Pillow, Pillow cover, Bucket and Mug and other essential item were distributed to all the children.

#### **Documentation of Child Status:**

The process of collecting the information on Child Status Package for each and every sponsored child was quite hectic, and literally our team members had to race against time in order to send the data to our donors CCCI at the earliest. The professionalism of our team members came to the fore, as they rose to the occasion to complete the task in time.

#### "Home Away from Home" - A Boon to Rural Children :

Nearly a decade long experience in implementing the CCCI sponsored TAMIL Project showed that the children from the interior villages, studying in the local schools as Day Scholars, find it extremely difficult to match children from privileged sections in standards both academic and social development parameters. A policy decision had been taken to accommodate children mainly in hostels with adequate infrastructure to help them acquire all-round development.

In line with the above policy, this year 86 girls have been accommodated to the St. Antony's Hostel at Konnaikudy and 95 boys to the "Hello Boys Home" at Kumbakonam, This move has helped the sponsored children to get admitted in the reputed schools managed by the Catholic Church. With this a total of 373 children have been so for accommodated in the hostels out of the total of 957 TAMIL Project sponsored children.

# Distribution of Educational Kit:

All the children were distributed the cash to be paid as school fees along with the school uniforms and school bags and other educational kit such as Geometry box, Sketch box, Colour pencil, Pen, Ruler etc. In the month of June, the beginning of the academic year was marked by individual family visits made for the purpose of case studies and documentation.

## Loving Special Gifts from Donors :-

During the year, special gift amounts were received from the individual donors on special occasions like the birth days of sponsored children, festivals like Christmas and New Year etc.

A good number of sponsored children were presented with apart from cash, a variety of Special Gifts such as Gold ear ring, wrist watch, cash, teapoy, table

fan, iron box, chair, dress, hot box etc from the cash gifts lovingly sent by the individual donors of these children.

And in some cases, these cash gifts were utilized towards repairs of the houses of the families of sponsored children, like laying of roof, construction of toilets, bath room and fitting of doors etc. according to the needs of the poor families of the children. A total of 175 children received such gifts from their individual donors.

# Little Artistic Creations as X'mas Greetings:

All the sponsored children sent self created artifacts as Christmas Greetings to the respective foster parents during the Christmas season of 2006. Some of the Greeting Cards were so beautifully created, showing the hidden artistic talents of many of the children.

## Visit of Officials from CCCI:

The Advisory committee comprising of the representatives of the parents of the sponsored children met 4 times during the year. In the months of June, August, October, January. The matters concerning the visit of the officials from CCCI, the summer camps and the development of children etc. were discussed during the meetings.

The Visitors from CCCI Canada Deacon Eugene, Madam Myrna and Fr.Jaimy, Regional Director CCCI paid official visit to the TAMIL project. They also graced the Sponsor's Day Celebrations organized together with Sports Day on 7th October 2006. Colourful cultural events also were staged by the Sponsored Children, enthralling the gathering and our beloved visitors from CCCI. The Regional Director Rev. Fr. Jaimy again visited the Tamil Project and spent 3 days here from 11th December to 13 December.

# Other Activities & Proposed Sponsorships:

I.D. cards and T.shirts were given to all the children and similarly hostel uniforms were distributed to the children residing the Hello Boys Home, Kumbakonam and Fathima Mercy Home at Vadaveekam. And similarly the children were distributed the new sets of dress for Christmas, Hot packs, Rice and Groceries in the month of December. The Medical Checkup conducted in all the 6 Vicariates of the Diocese on 27.12.2007.

The TAMIL Project sponsorship staff members were taken to Mettupalayam and Coimbatore for Staff Training and Review. The Regional Director also participated. In the month of March Seminars for the parents were conducted in all the 6 Vicariates of the Diocese. The theme was about the responsibilities towards the growth of the children.

During the current year, a total of 290 applications for New Sponsorships have been requested and papers filed for the same.

# 5. COW PROJECT

The "Cow Project" is one of the very highly productive economic empowerment native being implemented exclusively for the socially most oppressed section of Dalits, being to our Diocese. This project has been carried out for the last 3 years, with be benevolent support being extended through the initiatives of Mr. Eduardo Traver Nicolau y Nieves of Spain.

Among the members of the Dalit community the most deserving persons -Widows, the women deserted by their husbands apart from the economically most backward were identified and given priority in the selection of beneficiaries. The process of selection of beneficiaries and continued monitoring and evaluation of the project is handled by the committee comprising solely by the representatives of Dalit community from all the 6 Vicariates of our Diocese and the recommendation of respective Parish Priests.

One of the salient features of this project is 40% subsidy being allowed for all those beneficiaries who are prompt in repaying the loans obtained for procurement of

Milch Animals. For the beneficiaries, the project has proved to be a great boon, thanks to the perennial demand for the commodity of milk.

This year 50 beneficiaries 47 Women and 3 Men received loans of Rs. 10,000/-each for the purpose of procuring cows for income generation and a total of Rs.5,00,000/- has been extended as loan to them. The beneficiaries of this year belong to the villages of Thirupazhanam, Valangaiman, Othakadai Idaiyathumangalam and Regunathapuram falling under different Vicariates. So far, an amount of Rs.19,79,200/- has been extended as loans to 204 members of Dalit community of our Diocese through this project.

#### Special Activities:

Susaipparpattinam, Ayyampettai, Mathur, Ammapettai, Pudukuppam, Famerichi, Punalvasal, Keela Michaelpatti, Kumilanguzhi villages the groups meet conce in a month for the purpose of strengthening the pastoral services, visiting and for remedial services. Samathuva Pongal Vizha was organized by the Group and celebrated at Mela muscanthuruthi and free meal was supplied to the public.

Coping Day programme was celebrated on 23.08.2003 in which 361 persons from Groups took part actively in competition and cultural programs. With the help of Discusse pastoral centre, a seminar was organized on 21.12.2006 and 22.12.2006, which so persons of belong to 6 attended and benefited with more information, awareness and communion.

#### Income Generation Programmes (IGP):

- Kolping group members benefited through rearing goats, improved agriculture activities, running petty shops and crafts works.
- Three persons benefited by expanding their small business.
- Three members have been involved in brick kiln making.
- Preparation of incense powder for prayer purposes is done by Ayyampettai Groups.
- At the rate of Rs,5,000/- per groups, 8 Kolping Groups deposited in hello project of KMSSS and benefiting themselves regularly.
- Susaiapparpattinam and Mathur Kolping groups are on the First and second place in their effective performance and activities, record maintenance, economic programme, asset creation and team work etc,

## Problems:

- Transport cost is more expensive.
- Expected cooperation is not extended in few places by the parishioners.

## Solution:

Inform and solve such problems through prior consultation with the local Parish Priest about the Kolping meetings and make collective decisions and conclusions.

# 8. "HELLO" - PEOPLE'S POWER PROJECT

#### Introduction:

With a scope of benefiting the target population of the KMSSS, an innovative programme named "Hello" Project was conceived by the Secretary and initiated with blessings on April 12th, 2006 by the Most Rev. Bishop P. Remigius, D.D, It embraces the people of below poverty line (SHGs) as the primary target and the secondary group includes KMSSS projects beneficiaries, staff and other supportive organization.

#### Aim:

To ensure sustainable avenues of job opportunities to the SHG members, through engaging themselves in known trade and to provide Quality Home requirements to the members of SHGs and others and benefit by sale proceeds and to avoid middle men exploitation.

To cater to the family grocery requirements of target population, to purchase, process and supply grocery items such as Coriander, Chilly, Dhal, Grams, Beans, Spice, Aniseed, Pepper, Custard, Cumin, Dill, Oil and incense sticks, powder etc., through involving SHGs as Cooperative share owners.

The SHG representatives are engaged in Hello project as Manager, Accountant, Supervisor, Production Assistant and packing Assistant work on full time basis. The project enables opportunities of self earning and employment to SHG members.

# Method of Operation:

During the harvesting season required grocery items are purchased from the open market and processed, dried for durability of utilization. After grinding into small particles or powder form the products are mixed appropriately in proper ratio and packed as ready made item for distribution using automatic pouch packing machine. The grocery items are packed in various measures in grams according to the people requirement. Only *Garam Masala - Sambar Podi* is powdered and packed. The entire process of grading, grinding and packing are done in hygienic condition. Oil is purchased in bulk and repacked for distribution and sale. Incense sticks are made, using locally available raw materials and packed and sold to the consumers.

## Bemefits:

Essential groceries such as Masala Powders, Oil for cooking food and incense are prepared and distributed to the target population at a reasonable low cost with quality, comparing the local market prices.

#### Future :

Since there is a greater demand for mosquito repellent among the people in general, we propose to find a formula and prepare Herbal Mosquito repellent.

# 9. REMI COMPUTER EDUCATION

To augment and bring out the hidden talents and potentials of the youth (School going age Children) of lower strata families of the society, the Remi Computer Centre has been established recently under the overall guidance and control of the Secretary KMSSS with required basic infrastructure, essential soft and hardware resources to cater to the demands of the neighbouring Little Flower Higher Secondary School students and children of the poor families of nearby area.

This unit is well equipped with required services of technical men and materials.

Short term computer training to children and Spoken English course are being conducted in this centre.

Courses are designed and conducted exclusively to serve the 10th/ +2 students / Religious Fathers / Sisters / Lay persons and Ladies. Food and accommodation facilities were arranged to outside students during the special Summer Courses.

# 10. SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE AMONG DRY LAND FARMERS

Title : "Facilitation of Sustainable Agriculture among Dry Land

Farmers in 30 village Panchayats - Andimadam Block"

Project Location : Andimadam Union - 30 village Panchayats.

Duration : 3 years (Date of commencement: 21.11.2006).

#### Aims and Objectives:

To find stabilities and enhance natural resources through Sustainable means, monitoring and managerial skills and learn techniques in irrigation watershed, recycling of farm nutrients and flow of organic matter.

- To enable 600 small farmers, to achieve profitability in dry land farming through sustainable agriculture practices.
- To facilitate trainings and follow up on sustainable agriculture through model farm of KMSSS.
- To enable thousands of other small farmers, to adopt the sustainable environmental enhancement.

#### Introduction:

The area and population identified for this project, have very less employment opportunities due to seasonal vagaries and dry weather conditions. The small farmers are not able to withstand the risks involved due to environmental factors, use of indiscriminate chemical fertilizer, pesticides and expensive farming methods which resulted in scope-less attitude among the farmers. Realizing the problem of target population (farming community), with a judicial combination of external input as its main component, the project is initiated.

The project focuses on augmenting Agricultural development in dry land area with organic farming practices, reducing the cost of cultivation and production of crops, free from harmful insecticidal and fertilizer application and enhancement of ecological balance and sustainable measure of cultivation.

## **Execution and Methodology:**

Preparatory, preplanning and briefing session was conducted on 16.12.2006 and 22.02.2007 at Andimadam in which the local parishioners, V.F. and people's representatives and project staff took active role in explain the discuss and to arriving a final plan of Action. For selection of beneficiaries of the project the following criteria were followed:

- People of small land holding.
- Belong to below poverty line.
- Widow or destitute and sangam (Group) members.

# Model Farm and Farm Shed Preparation and Construction :

Primarily for the purpose of project demonstration and training, a model farm and shed are under construction. In Melaneduvai village, Garden and model farm in lacres of land is being developed.

#### Bore well:

It has been planned to sink 3 bore wells in different villages of the project area, we bore well is completed at Melaneduvai. At Senapallam and Arulanandapuram the mection of Bore well work is under progress. These 3 bore wells will ensure water and facilitate Farmers in cultivation work without any problem.

#### Tractor:

Exclusively for ploughing purposes, a Tractor with a Trailer and accessories has purchased and it is being used in the project to benefit the target population.

# Grouping of villages and beneficiaries:

All the 600 beneficiaries of the project are grouped under 6 divisions having the background of the cosmos, land, water, tree and living beings and for easy identification, management and to speed up easy service facilities.

To orient the beneficiaries on specific programme methods and project activities, training was organized on relevant topics of subject matter. Since the beneficiaries include both farming labourers and farmers the central theme and contents of Training were according to the project programme objectives such as Natural farming, composting, natural pesticides/vermi compost preparation, Pancha Kaviya, problems in agricultural operations, animal rearing, sustainable farming, conservancy measures and external input for productive cultivation. So far, about 348 participants were trained under this project.

On 22.02.2007 an observation visit was organized to Coimbatore for the beneficiaries of the project. Mr. Lawrence Coordinator of the Coimbatore

Multipurpose Social Service Society explained the participants in detail the functioning and development of "Manos Garden". He also briefed about the procedures involved in loan repayment, savings scheme etc.

For the purpose field exposure visit, 52 persons visited Mettupalayam for two days and learned the natural farming practices such as Vermi compost preparation composting methods, *Pancha Kaviya* preparation, inter crop cultivation animal rearing. Herbal pesticides preparation etc.,

# Branch Office at Andimadam:

For easy monitoring and managerial purposes and to ensure close contact and communication with the beneficiaries, exclusively under the project a Branch Office has been established in a rented building from the month of January 2007 at Andimadam. Field Programme Staff find it convenient to discuss and review the progress periodically and this also serves as a meeting place for the beneficiaries of the project.

# 11. JANA SHREE BIMA YOJANA

(L.I.C. INDIA)

The KMSSS in collaboration with the Life Insurance corporation of India with the aim of benefiting the people of below poverty status, this scheme is popularized among target population of KMSSS. To this effect, in association with the L.I.C India the "Jana Shree Bima Yojana" Group Insurance Policy was introduced to the SHG members in the year 2003.

This year, during the period of reporting (2006 - 2007), a total of 469 persons belong to women sangams and male groups registered themselves by paying an annual minimum premium of Rs.100/- or more according to their capacity of income. The major criterion for eligibility of this scheme is:

- Any person, with an income of below poverty status.
- In the age group of 18 59.

This scheme covers the Policy Holder for a period of one year. For next year a fresh renewal amount has to be remitted for continuity and coverage and benefit.

# Eligible claims and benefits:

The scheme extends financial help of Rs.20,000/- if death occurs by nature during qualifying year. If died in accident Rs. 75.000/-, for loss of an organ in accident Rs.50,000/-, for inactivated part of body due to accident Rs. 35,000/-. Thus a graded benefit is given according to this criteria and the qualifying period.

#### Received:

the children of those who enrolled under this scheme, an educational stance of Rs. 1,200/- is provided per year, for IX, X, +1,+2 and ITI students. Among 469 insured parents, 250 students were given a total sum of Rs.3,00,000/-. this, first installment of Rs. 61,800/- for 103 children, IInd installment of 44,100/- for 147 children benefited. Remaining amount Rs. 1,94,100/- will be butted in due course.

For those deceased, Death claims of Rs. 80,000/- was distributed to the legal of Kaliyamoorthy of Valangaiman, Ramachandran of Kumbakonam and Sekar of Sekalnayakkanpettai.

## 12. SPECIAL EVENTS AND CELEBRATIONS

KMSSS takes pride in organizing and celebrating special days and functions which in congruence with its aims and objectives of the projects and programmes. The setails of such items are described hereunder.

International Labour's Day. On 24.05.2006, the Diocesan Social Service Societies - the KMSSS and PSSS jointly organized the "May Day" as District Agricultural labourers convention at Ariyalur.

## Local Body Leaders Meeting:

- To felicitate and encourage the leaders who succeeded in the local body election the KMSSS organized a special function in which 40 persons took part. Vicar General Very Rev. Fr. C. Peter Francis graced the occasion by blessing and presenting Shawls to them as a token of love and briefly described their role as change promoters.
- International Women's Day was celebrated on 08.03.2007 at Coimbatore, reiterating the Demand of 33% reservation for women in Government job and services. Programme staff and 50 women belong to the KMSSS field area villages participated in the function.

# 13. COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION

a. Project period : 2 years from April 2005.

b. Operational Area : 187 Villages in Thiruvidaimarudur Block

(48 Village Panchayats, 5 Town Panchayats)

c. Funding Partner : The CBR Forum, Bangalore.

## II. Objective:

To empower the disabled persons in the project area villages and to attain equal rights and social equity similar to others in the society, through self help process, skill development, education and advocacy with involvement of the community.

This project was initiated with basic data collection in the year 2002, in continuation of this the II and III phase programme activities were implemented in consonance with the aims and expectations of the agency. The IV phase programme was started in the year 2005 and being carried out successfully.

#### c. Rehabilitation Services :

- Involving medical specialists in Ortho, Physiotherapy, Eye, Ear and Nose, 4 medical camps were conducted in Thirunageswaram on 17<sup>th</sup>and 19<sup>th</sup> October 2006, in which 1380 persons obtained I.D card for disability.
- To ensure care and attention to new born, 333 babies born in various hospitals, were thoroughly examined and 7 babies were identified with hearing impairment and referred for treatment.
- On examination of 759 children of under five age group, ten children were diagnosed as hearing impaired and their parents have been advised on medical follow up of children.

KMSSS, availing the linkages of networking organizations and Government Departments provided rehabilitative services as collaborative venture, to benefit the disabled.

# V. Special Events:

# a. Day of 'Differently Abled' persons:

Celebrations of 'Disabled persons' was organized on 05.12.06, with a Rally inaugurated by the local DSP Ms. Mutharasi. Sports and cultural programs were held as part of the celebration. Our Most Rev. Bishop, Dist Rehabilitation Officer and Vicar General of the Diocese graced the occasion by delivering special address and distributing prizes and tools of rehabilitation and bank loans. These activities infused the sense of self confidence in the minds of the participants on their own ability, civic Rights and favourable attitudes in them.

- b. The disabled groups' office bearers (representatives) met the General Manager of Tamil Nadu State Transport Department of Kumbakonam depot and briefed the ill treatment shown to the disabled in Government owned bus. On representation by the Disability office bearers, The General Manager assured to prevent such ill treatment in the future.
- In local body Panchayat Board Elections, 7 persons contested and 4 women got elected as ward members and 1 male member was elected as Panchayat President.

## d. Day Care Centre:

Two Day Care Centres have been established at Gangadaranallur and Thirucherrai villages and providing services to the children with cerebral palsy, MR, Orthopedic and physiotherapy problems. Ten children are availing services regularly. The benefiaries are ensured with specific schedule of training and therapy services by trained workers.

# 14. Educational Assistance - Scholarship

The need of education is being realized by our target population, year after year the KMSSS receives increased number of applications in favour of assistance to achieve proficiency and BC children of below poverty line families approach the KMSSS with the recommendations from the local Parish Priest and the Head of the education institutions.

The Diocesan Bishop, Vicar General and SC/ST Commission representatives screen the applications received from the Diocese area students and finalize the list of eligible students to avail educational scholarship. The details of such beneficiaries are as follows:

Thus the assistance results in reduction of drop outs, illiteracy and positively contributes for the continuity of studies of socially and educationally backward community children.

# 15. EMERGENCY RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

Owing to the sudden rain and flood in Cauvery Delta region, heavy damage has been resulted to crops, fields, dwelling units and communication links during beginning of this year. Immediate relief measures were carried out to the affected people by the Revenue Department and Non-Government Organizations.

The depth of severity and its damage has been studied by the KMSSS team and a proposal was submitted seeking assistance to Manos Unidas for restoration of livelihood, environment reclamation and residential houses to the families who lost their houses.

With the generous assistance extended by Manos Unidas in addition to relief and rehabilitation, concrete housing facility were provided based on the criteria of - wnership of land patta, widow/Destitute and income below poverty line to victims of the flood and rain.

From the fund received from CARITAS INDIA for rehabilitation to the victims a total of 100 new houses constructed. Each cost Rs.55,000/- with Beneficiary contribution of Rs.5,000/- All the houses were handed over to the victims as a permanent measure avoid future problems of similar calamity. For partly damaged 100 houses an amount of Rs.5,000/- was provided each as assistance.

As part of implementation of the above services the local people were given a short orientation on "Disaster Preparedness".

#### Impact:

All the beneficiaries are very happy in their new, permanent concrete houses each with 240 sq.ft. and their lifetime expectation of one of the basic need is fulfilled. The compensation assistance provided to them were realized by the beneficiaries as the immediate, timely and permanent relief to the victims.

# 16. MSW STUDENTS FIELD TRAINING

#### Introduction:

To fulfill the social work PG Degree course curricular requirement, the Istyear MSW Students of Bon Secours College for women, Thanjavur were placed in KMSSS Kumbakonam, from 5th February to 31st March 2007.

#### Aim:

For equipping the students to become practitioners in social work with professional knowledge, skills, attitudes and values that are necessary for the students.

The KMSSS has given the students the opportunity to practice and experience and to acquire information about the placement organization, involve themselves in the KMSSS field activities, participate in the programs, visit other Agencies - Government Departments, conducting case studies, group work, community organization, recording and documentation of their experiences.

In consultation with the Agency's supervisor, the students were guided on basics of Data collection, programme planning, people's participation, leadership, community organization, communication, documentation etc., An itinerary was prepared for the students and they were oriented by the Personnel Manager about the organization, programmes which are being implemented by the KMSSS.

For their field work experience, Thirumanampettai and Murukkangudi villages of Thiruvidaimarudur Taluk were assigned to gain practical experience from field lab with the assistance of the local field programme staff of the KMSSS. After completion of their field work placement, they have submitted their "Consolidated report on field work" to the Secretary KMSSS.
